Outcome statement/Te tauāki ā-hua

Strategic Purpose statement/Te rautaki o te tohu

The purpose of this qualification is to provide the youth work sector with youth workers who have the broad operational and theoretical knowledge, skills and attitudes to contribute to the development and safety of taiohi.

This qualification is for people who intend to enhance their skills, knowledge and practice within the youth work sector.

Graduates will be able to carry out youth work roles under managerial supervision and guidance.

Graduates will support the social and cultural aspirations of Māori and Pacific people(s) and demonstrate their commitment to Te Tiriti o Waitangi through their interactions with taiohi and their communities and their work.

Graduate Profile/Ngā hua o te tohu

Graduates of this qualification will be able to:

- Mentor and support taiohi to recognise and develop their potential in an ethical and safe environment.

- Apply youth development frameworks to lead and evaluate youth development projects.

- Apply knowledge of Te Tiriti o Waitangi to uphold and honour the history of Māori as tangata whenua in youth work practice.
- Apply knowledge of mental health and wellbeing, and digital safety in a youth development context.
- Reflect on own practice and implement self-care strategies when working with taiohi.

Education Pathway/Ngā huarahi mātauranga

This qualification builds on the New Zealand Certificate in Youth Work (Level 3) [Ref: 2448].

The qualification leads to the New Zealand Certificate in Youth Work (Level 5) [Ref: 4795] and may lead to higher level qualifications in youth work or other social services.

Employment, Cultural, Community Pathway/Ko ngā huarahi ā-mahi, ā-ahurea, ā-whānau, ā-hapū, ā-iwi, ā-hapori anō hoki

Graduates will be qualified to work in intermediate vocational roles working with taiohi.

Roles may include leading programmes, projects and events delivered by peer support groups, youth service agencies and community or marae or faith-based groups.

Graduates may seek employment in youth work or youth development in a range of settings: non-governmental organisations, justice/corrections, social services, residential and community, iwi services, mental health support, peer support, and those that operate in a cultural or faith-based context.

General conditions for programme/Ngā tikanga whānui o te hōtaka

Youth Work is the development of a mana enhancing relationship between a youth worker and taiohi, where taiohi actively participate, discover their power, and choose to engage for as long as agreed; and that supports their holistic, positive development as taiohi that contribute to themselves, their whānau, community and world.

Programme design, delivery and assessment must be carried out in accordance with Mātauranga Māori and the principles of contemporary overarching acts, positive youth development frameworks, codes and strategies, including:

- Te Tiriti o Waitangi
- Mana Taiohi Framework
- Code of Ethics for Youth Work in Aotearoa New Zealand
- United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCROC)
- Children, Young Persons, and Their Families
 (Vulnerable Children) Amendment Act 2014
