

Who are Toitū te Waiora?


Toitū te Waiora are the Workforce Development Council.

We help organisations make and teach ***qualifications*** for workers in





- social services
- education
- health.







We help organisations, employers and community groups make training and education better and more ***accessible***.

Accessible means everyone can use and understand the training and education programs.

What is the disability support project?



We will make 2 new qualifications for better training for disability support workers.



The new qualifications are the New Zealand Certificate in Disability Support Level 3 and Level 4.



Disability support providers will teach the training for the qualifications.



The qualifications will help workers learn the right skills to give better support to disabled people and their whānau.



We will make new rules for the skills and knowledge disability workers need to do a good job.



People with these qualifications can be

- Disability Support Workers
- Disability Information Consultants
- Disability Case Workers.

Why are there new qualifications?



We spoke to disabled people and their families about why we need new qualifications.



They told us

• some support workers need more training



- many families and whānau have to teach support workers basic things
 - for example, personal care skills




 disability support workers do **not** always have the same skills.

How will the qualifications make support better?



Support workers will learn skills like


• personal care



Support workers will understand disability *rights*

and respect people's choices.

• how to communicate better.



Rights are things everyone should be able to have and do.



Support will be more about the person who needs care.



Support workers will respect and understand different cultures and backgrounds.







Who is helping to make the qualifications?

We will listen to the ideas and stories of

- disabled people and their families
- support workers and disability groups
- training experts and the workforce development council.

Will disabled people be part of the project?



Disabled people and the disability community will share their lived experience to make sure the new qualifications meet the needs of everyone.



How will the project help the disability community?

Training for support workers will give them the right skills and knowledge.



Disabled people will get the same care and support from different support workers.



Better training for disability support workers will make sure the disability community has the best care and support.

When will the training happen?



We want to have the qualifications written by June 2025.



Training providers can start teaching the qualifications when the government says ok.

We hope this happens by the end of 2025.
